



Michaelina Wautier, Painter

Forgotten, erased, celebrated: the Kunsthistorisches Museum in Vienna is showing the largestever exhibition on Michaelina Wautier – one of the most exciting rediscoveries in recent art history.

From 30 September 2025 to 22 February 2026, the Kunsthistorisches Museum in Vienna is dedicating its major autumn exhibition to the Flemish Baroque painter Michaelina Wautier (1614/18-1689). This comprehensive survey of her oeuvre includes paintings never before on show to the public. The exhibition is a collaboration between the Kunsthistorisches Museum and the Royal Academy of Arts in London.

"Michaelina Wautier is one of the most exciting art-historical rediscoveries in recent decades. The Kunsthistorisches Museum will show the works of a great baroque artist who for centuries was overlooked and her paintings attributed to male contemporaries", says Jonathan Fine, Director General of the Kunsthistorisches Museum.

A Woman who Painted History - and then Disappeared from it

Michaelina Wautier was a truly exceptional seventeenth-century artist. But for centuries her paintings were ignored, overlooked or attributed to male artists. Her works – history paintings, portraits, altarpieces, allegories – upended contemporary perceptions of female artists, and are characterized by innovation, a fine sense of humour, and psychological depth.

Her monumental *Triumph of Bacchus*, for instance, was until the 1960s erroneously attributed to a pupil of Rubens or even Luca Giordano – considered too large, too powerful, with too many male nudes to be the work of a female artist. Today, the painting is regarded as an iconic work and one of the highlights of the Picture Gallery of the Kunsthistorisches Museum.



See the Largest-Ever Show of her Works in Vienna

The exhibition at the Kunsthistorisches Museum is the largest-ever show of her works comprising 29 paintings, one signed drawing, and a print after one of her lost compositions – including her celebrated cycle *The Five Senses*, the first time the whole series will be seen in Europe since it was painted. In total, the Kunsthistorisches Museum is showing 80 artworks, both works from its own holdings and international loans.

Many of Michaelina Wautiers paintings are in private collections in Europe and the US, which is why they are rarely seen – but they have been assembled for this spectacular show. In Vienna, Wautier's paintings will be placed in a dialogue with works from classical antiquity, Rubens, van Dyck and other contemporaries.

Art History as a Journey of Discovery

There is much we (still) do not know about the life of Michaelina Wautier. The exact date of her birth and the place where she trained as an artist remain uncertain. She presumably shared a studio in Brussels with her elder brother Charles. Archduke Leopold Wilhelm, regent of the Spanish Netherlands and the period's leading art collector, owned works by her. However, no contemporary comments on her art have survived. We have neither letters nor personal testimonials – only her paintings. These, however, reveal an intelligent, cultivated, courageous, confident and highly-original woman, who proudly signed her works "invenit et fecit", "invented and executed by me".

"We have almost no biographical data, documents or letters, but we have her paintings. That's enough to reveal one of the period's strongest female artists", says Gerlinde Gruber, curator of the exhibition.

Following the exhibition's premiere in Vienna, an adapted version of the exhibition will move to the Royal Academy of Artis in London in 2026.
